What is a literature review?

- Focuses on what has been researched before on the topic
 - Areas of agreement/disagreement
 - Contributions of the research
 - Limitations
 - Gaps in the research

(Davidson & Tolich, 1999, p. 94)
*You're constructing **an argument** about previous research on the topic*

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Some important considerations

- How can the literature review be used to justify the topic?
- What format is useful for arranging the review?
- How do you start?

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Purpose: To inform and persuade

Literature review



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Different uses of literature review

- Review leading to research questions/ hypotheses
- Review leading to conclusions on the topic (and recommendations)
- Review leading to new or adapted theoretical model or framework for new model

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An examination of the key research on a topic

Involves:


- The selection of available documents on the topic, which contain ideas, data and evidence
- The effective evaluation of these documents in relation to [your research]
- The synthesis of information into a coherent "story" of knowledge on the topic

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Research history forms the starting point for your research

- All research has a history
- It is this history that provides the precedent for further work
- It is what forms the starting point for your research.

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How is a literature review organised?

- by key themes or findings
- arranged in headings and sub-headings
- as an **argument** that *flows*
information from various sources is *synthesised* to form a coherent argument
- Try to ensure each part justifies your research




